This time, the first in a series of PhotoMails on shots from four of the big cities of Europe - Amsterdam, Berlin, London & Paris. It's quite startling just how different they are, each with it's own distinctive character. The shots are impressions of each city as created by its people, streets, buildings, cafe-life and art & culture. First up, some of the buildings, their architecture & design and how they are used.

The Shard is the centre-piece London of the development - the construction cost of which is ZambianKwacha 12,000,000,000,000,000 (is that twelve ZILLION?) It has 306 flights of stairs and 44 lifts (elevators) and if you are a family of 4 and want to enjoy

the spectacular view from the observation deck some 244m (800ft) up, the ear-popping ride will cost you ZambianKwacha 696,000. Now you know.



(Sacre Coeur) atop Montmartre. A "tortured history" meant that it took some 39 years to build, reaching completion only in 1914.





The Shard, London (named after a broken, The somehat wacky Lloyds Building (it seems to have all its plumbing on the sharp piece of glass), was completed in July outside...) reflected in the grand Willis building in the City of London's square this year. At 87-storeys high, it is Europe's tallest mile. Obviously there's a lot of money to be made selling insurance.

Berlin. The Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe (a.k.a. The Holocaust Memorial). A powerful and uneasy memorial to the six million Jews in Europe slaughtered by Hitler's Nazi regime during World War 11. It consists of 2,711 grey concrete blocks (or "stelae") laid out in an area of 19,000 sq m in central Berlin. Each block is just 95cm distant from its neighbour, such that you walk between them alone. This large scale sculpture, by architect Peter Eisenman, was
